Park History



In 1922 the city of Janesville purchased a naturally beautiful tract of land along the Rock River that would become Riverside Park. Henry Traxler, our first City Manager, and Joe Lustig, City Engineer, developed Riverside into the premier park of Southern Wisconsin. Landscape architect Charles H. Lawrence was hired to design Janesville's first Regional Park. The plan included a golf course on the upper escarpment and an 87 acre park on the lower river frontage. A scenic river drive lead past quaint picnic pavilions, play areas, wooded hillsides, beautiful landscaping and a large baseball diamond.

In the 1920's and 1930's many more amenities were brought to the park. The Devil's Staircase hiking path was developed. Two beautiful artesian wells that fed into natural limestone pools were constructed. The children's wading pool, Janesville's first, was built. Shuffle board and tennis courts were constructed. New pavilions, bathrooms, and concession stands were built and the south river wall and boat launch area were constructed using workers from the WPA project.

In the 1940's the "Silver Queen" a large pontoon type boat operated from the park. The Silver Queen had a juke box for dancing, a concession stand and could carry 150 passengers. The Riverside and Great Northern Railway, a miniature steam train, gave rides from 1940-1953. In the late 50's to early 60's the Jaycees ran a downhill ski program, giving lessons to many Janesville youth. Riverside offered the best sledding hills in town. In the 1970's miniature sports car races were held in the park.

Whatever the season, Riverside Park was the place to go for family fun and recreation.
